You can refer children and young people to us for direct support in all schools across the Black Country where there are issues with domestic abuse. Additionally you can call us for advice and to access our training.

#### **Support includes:**

1 to 1 support and advocacy based on the child's needs in school.

Group support programmes in school.

### Why Consent?

To support any children directly in your school we need the parent's consent, unless they are 13 or over. Without this, we cannot accept a referral.

# Getting Parental Consent

**Guidance for Teachers** 



### What's the Problem?

It can be hard to get consent from parents for children to work with us.

There may be a lot of things going on for the parent, and they may see things differently to the child or you.

It is important to remember this and consider the parent's feelings at all times when having the conversation, whilst being as honest as possible.

Having an open conversation can allow you to allay fears they may have, and we can help with this.

## Mis Parents may be confused about our service

They may think they protect their child and can't see they are impacted.
