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What is a newspaper?

There are two different kinds of national newspapers in the UK:

Broadsheets: these are newspapers printed on large sheets of newspaper.

Tabloids: these are printed on smaller sheets of newspaper.

Sub-heading

An opening paragraph is usually written in bold font and tells the reader briefly about the details of the story.

The rest of the article provides a more detailed report of the event.

Headlines

Newspaper headlines are designed to attract the reader's attention.

- Use dramatic or emotional words, such as:
 - Crisis Drama Clash Fury Battle Row
- Alliteration 'Pick up a Penguin'
- Puns 'Kentucky Freed Chicken' (Jokes)
- Rhymes/half rhymes 'St Helen's Glass has the class'
 'Beanz Meanz Heinz'

Try to use a range of techniques- such as alliteration, puns, full and half-rhyme.

Direct Speech

These words came DIRECTLY from Mrs. Jones' mouth

Quotations in Newspaper Articles

Reported Speech

It was a complete surprise for Mrs Jones when Robbie Williams turned up at her shop.

These aren't the actual words that Mrs. Jones said, although it does tell us how she felt.
