 Number Activities: Practise counting up to 10 and then 20. Continue practicing counting backwards from 10children can pretend to be rockets and start off tall with arms in the air and slowly crouching down as the numbers get smaller chanting 10,9,8,7,6,5,4,3,2,1, then when they get to zero they jump up and say blast off! Write out the digits 4 and 5. Children could begin by air writing the numbers with their finger, then tracing these numbers, and finally copying these numbers through different media e.g. pencil, sand, paint, foam. 		 Read a variety of books at home. Favourites can be repeated. Hearing the patterns of language in a story will support your child's language development. Throughout May, we will be posting a story every day on our Nursery Twitter page (@NurseryUmps). Head to our page and follow us for some ideas for stories! Ask questions about a story as you read with your child e.g. what did the character say? What happened at the beginning of the story middle? What might happen at the end of the story? (up to 5, and then to 10). Alternatively, you could place cheerios in a line on a surface. Count the cheerios and then match to the correct numeral.

• Extension: Count out up to 6 objects from a larger set

Give you child a small pile of cheerios (or other objects). Show them a numeral 0 - 6and ask your child to give you that number of objects from their pile. You could practice this by whispering the numbers as you count and say the last number loudly.

Extension

Write these letters individually on pieces of paper and place them next to each other to make a word. See if children can read the word by sounding out each sound and then blending them together: S - U - n = SUN.



Learning Project to be done throughout the week

The project this week aims to provide opportunities for your child: To develop an understanding of growth, decay and changes over time

Story: The Ugly Duckling (You can find this story on YouTube)

Share the story with your child throughout the week. Encourage your child to join in with the story and say some parts themselves. Ask them...'What happened at the beginning of the story...What happened next? Why did the other ducklings not like him? What happened at the end of the story? What was your favourite part of the story? Did the duckling look the same at the end of the story? How did he look different?

• Drawing a picture

Draw a picture of the ugly duckling and then another one of when he grows into an adult. Talk about how the duckling changed over time from a baby to an adult. Look at some photographs of your family. Have you changed or do you look the same? Do your family members look different? How? Will you look the same when you are older?

Looking at baby animals

Look at the attached document from twinkl: animals and their young. See if you can match the baby animals to their adult. How do they look? Do they look different/same as an adult?

• Sing 'Old MacDonald's Easter Farm'

See next page for song lyrics. We learnt this song before the Easter holidays, can your child remember it? Sing it every day. We have given you three verses, but can you swap the animal names to make new verses, e.g. "And on that farm he has a puppy, that's a baby dog", kitten/cat etc.
